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

Program Descriptions

All of our programs are developed to fulfill the requirements of the Ontario Curriculum for grades 9-12 in Social Studies, Geography, History, Career Studies, Travel and Tourism, and Introduction to Anthropology, Psychology, and Sociology. We strive to use archaeology as a vehicle for meeting curriculum specific objectives and to further enhance knowledge of archaeological practices and techniques as well as the history of Kingston and the region. All program topics are modified and adapted to each grade level.

Archaeology in a Nutshell I

Grades 9-12 - Social Sciences

Half-day or two 70-minute periods

Students are introduced to the essential aspects of archaeological research and excavation. Taking on the role of archaeologists, students examine archival documents, conduct a simulated excavation, and then identify and classify the artifacts they have found. This program meets curriculum requirement for Grade 9 Geography; Grade 11 Physical Geography; and Introduction to Anthropology, Psychology, and Sociology.

Archaeology in Nutshell II

Grades 9-12 - Social Sciences

Half day or two 70-minute periods

In a follow-up program to 'Archaeology in a Nutshell I,' students participate in an in-depth simulated excavation. They learn how stratigraphy helps archaeologists make sense of their findings, and then use journaling and mapping skills (including Geographic Information Systems) to record the excavation and the artifacts they find. This program meets curriculum requirement for Grade 9 Geography; Grade 11 Physical Geography; and Introduction to Anthropology, Psychology, and Sociology.

Archival Research I

Grade 10 - Applied and Academic History 70 minutes

Or a Half day (or two 70-minute periods) when combined with Archival Research II In the first part of the archival workshop, students learn the basics of archival research. They are given the opportunity to examine primary documents relevant to the Kingston area. This workshop can be taken on its own however we recommend paring it with Archival Research II.

Archival Research II

Grade 10 - Applied and Academic History

70 minutes

Or a Half day (or two 70-minute periods) when combined with Archival Research II In a follow-up activity, students apply research skills as they investigate an historical building in Kingston, using the archival documents available at the Kingston Archaeological Centre. Pre-requisite: this workshop must be taken as a follow-up to Archival Research II

Careers in Archaeology and Museum Management

Grade 10-12 - Career Studies; History; Introduction to Anthropology, Psychology, and Sociology

70 minutes

Students learn about career opportunities in archaeology and museum management through a discussion with an archaeologist and/or curator. Interested students are encouraged to gain first-hand experience in these fields by volunteering or participating in events at the Kingston Archaeological Centre.

The Rideau Canal: UNESCO and World Heritage

Grade 11 - Travel and Tourism

70 minutes

Students learn how the designation of the Rideau Canal and the Kingston Fortifications as a UNESCO World Heritage Site has impacted tourism in the region. They learn about the historical significance of this site and the ways archaeological research has contributed to its preservation. They are then given the opportunity to research another Heritage Site with archaeological significance; evaluating the impacts of increased tourism on this location.

Steps Through Time: Kingston's Role in Canadian History

Grade 10 - 12 - History

70 minutes

Students learn about the significant role of the Kingston area in Canadian history as they are guided through a walking tour of local archaeological sites. This program is only offered in September-October and May-June, so come out and take advantage of the warmer weather. While this is a fascinating tour for all history students, it is especially applicable for those enrolled in 'Canada: History, Identity, and Culture' (CHI4U)

Kingston Underground

Grades 9-12 – Social Sciences, History • 2.5-3 hours

Choose from a number of Kingston sites and experience Kingston from an archaeological perspective through a guided walking tour. This program is only offered in June so come out and take advantage of the great weather and learn about Kingston's fascinating history. This is a great way to end the school year.

Program Structure

Programs are designed around a 70 minute time period and are available both morning and afternoon. Our start times are flexible to adapt to your school hours. Combine any two programs to make the perfect half-day or full-day learning experience. Special programs can be arranged upon request, subject to additional fees.
